

The different ones with the colored leaves that I could not grow out of doors or even in the office, are coming along beautifully. I have about 23 different begonias, almost all of them are rather ordinary begonias, I presume, but they give me a lot of pleasure.

My sister, Mrs. Mehler, is also a member of the Begonia Society and we exchange slips. I got a package of seeds when I first joined from Mrs. Ruby Liedler of Long Beach, California, and it is marvelous the amount of plants that grew. The whole flat was covered and it is a very nice begonia, with big, soft flowers, some of them pale pink, some white and some pink and white.

I expect by Christmas these plants will be a very nice size and I expect to pass them on to different people and give a lot of pleasure. To me, that is one of the things the Begonia Society does, pass on pleasure to other people.

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To faithful old friends, cherished new friends, and those whose friendships we strive to deserve, our hearty Christmas Greetings are tendered.

BEGONIAS, CALIFORNIA AND THE A.B.S.

N the early seventies of the 19th century, gardening in Southern California was a problem. "Water was hauled from the river and sold at two bits (twenty-five cents a barrel) . . . Theodosia Burr Shepherd, founder of the flower seed industry of California and collector of rare plants, was a Begonia enthusiast . . . In the late '70's slips of the weedy greenish pink and greenish white semperflorens were given her; and later she acquired Hybrida multiflora . . . She was eager to possess the other varieties which she heard were growing in Dr. Dimmock's garden at Santa Barbara . . . When on a visit to this garden she was given cuttings of Odorata alba, Edmondsoni, and Evansiana . . . 1884 found her in possession of a tiny greenhouse with a handful of plants, mostly Begonias, potted in tomato cans . . . Her garden was listed by Frank Wiggan, Secretary of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce as one of the "Show Places of the South." Lath houses were filled with Begonias, great bushes of them grew in shady places and semperflorens bordered paths . . . People made special trips from Los Angeles and Santa Barbara to see 'Mrs. Shepherd's famous Begonias.' . . . Great bushes of Odorata Alba, Gilsoni, Fuchsoides Coccinea and Robusta filled the gardens of Ventura and the town was known as the "Home of the Begonia . . . Mrs. Shepherd listed twenty-four varieties of fibrous begonias and many un-named Rex and tuberous rooted ones in her 1891 catalogue, Gigantea Rosea being her novelty for that year . . . Visitors came from all parts of the world and Mrs. Shepherd shipped plants to England, New Zealand, Australia, Algeria and Hawaii. She catalogued them in 1902 . . . again in 1906 her last catalogue. In it

she listed 63 varieties of fibrous, 9 Rex, 9 Semperflorens, and many tuberous rooted Begonias . . . It is regrettable that only one of Mrs. Shepherd's Begonias still bears the names she gave them . . . Marjorie Daw however was so greatly publicized that no one has had the temerity to appropriate it as his own . . . Her large plant of Majorie Daw was attacked by root rot . . . the disease that in time affected all of her Begonias . . . everything possible was done to save them without success . . . In a few years the famous collection was gone and eventually all plants about town succumbed; and Ventura ceased to be the home of the Begonia." (Excerpts from an Article by Myrtle Shepherd Francis, in the Bulletin of The American Begonia Society, July 1937.)

At the beginning of the twentieth century, or 1900, Mr. Alfred D. Robinson was beginning to get intensely interested, for I have a catalogue of his which shows a picture of 'the Rosecroft Collection in 1900.' Think of it—what a joy


my good wishes and hope that you will receive the splendid co-operation I have had in the past.

NEW BEGONIAS FROM THE **PHILLIPINES**

LL begonia enthusiasts know the delight which a new begonia brings, so you can well imagine thrilled Ι was to from the Phillipine islands, a celophane packet containing seeds, and a delicate, fernlike pressed spray of a trailing begonia. The tiny blossoms were apparentas yet unnamed, which were collected at Bagnio, Phillipines, this summer. No. 1 envelope contained seed, but no pressed specimen. No. 2 contained no seed, but flowers, and leaves which are shaped somewhat like B. heracleifolia var. Sunderbruchi, a native of Mexico. The leaf is deeply five parted dark green, with

ly pinkish white, and hairlike roots at the stem joint showed its trailing nature. It has been identified by Dr. E. D. Merrill, of the Arnold Arboretum, as B. incisa, discovered by Nee, in 1859. It is unknown in this country, but the seed has been distributed and it is hoped to be able to grow it.

Later, two more arrived, new species

bands of lighter color along the veins. It is smooth not hairy like Sunderbruchi, the stems are short and as small as those of a maple leaf, quite different from Sunderbruchi's long, thick, hairy stem. The color of the small flowers could not be determined, but showed a thick bunch of golden stamens in the center.

The Nomenclature

• 1941 has brought an important acquisition to the Nomenclature Department. The plant press has been put into immediate use and as soon as facilities have been provided for storing mounted specimens, exchanges can be made with other herbariums, and specimens may be furnished, upon request, for study by branch societies.

Taking advantage of one of the services offered by this department, three members shipped leaves and flowers to the Nomenclature Director for identification. These were all identified and mailed back on the day of receipt. Members are invited to make more use of this free service in the future. In sending plants for identification, a few young and a few mature leaves, as well as both male and female flowers, should be folded up in wax paper, then folded into newspaper, and sent by parcel post to the Nomenclature Director. While the leaves will be returned, it is well to number your plants and send the number along on the leaves and flowers so the name can be applied to the proper plant; the leaves will be dry before they get back to you.

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In the first numbers of the Begonian this year this department continued to discuss Begonia species, supplying the illustrations. Some criticism was expressed because the pictures were not of perfect specimens. The pictures were chosen to show essential parts of the plants, but rather than to give anyone of our beloved Begonias a bad send-off, no further articles were submitted and will not be until drawings of the essential parts of the flowers, stems, etc., can be made to illustrate the article, together with a picture of a perfect specimen of the plant.

An allotment of funds was made to this department for establishment of the herbarium of the American Begonia Society; of this, \$27.86 was expended for the plant press and herbarium supplies. There is a cash balance on hand in the department of \$4.14. There remains to the credit of the department in the treasury, \$39.13.

all wended our way home to profit by our evening and to plan for the year to come.


Yes, we have had a wonderful Fall season. The Begonias are still in bloom. When will they stop?

Control of Red Spider (Tetranychus Telarius) By Phthalic Glyceryl Alkyd Resin

HE common red spider (Tetranychus telarius L.), commonly found on greenhouse-grown plants and on many field crops, is extremely difficult to control. The ineffectiveness of many insecticides which have been recommended for control of red spiders may be ascribed to their lack of ovicidal action. Furthermore, chemicals which possess ovicidal properties are often injurious to cultivated plants, especially those grown in greenhouses.

In the course of an investigation, totally unrelated to the problem of red spider control, the writers observed that when a 2 per cent. phthalic glyceryl alkyd resin in water was applied to plants heavily infested with red spiders, the latter quickly disappeared. Microscopic examination of infested leaves showed large numbers of dead red spiders in all stages of development and masses of spiders' ova which had turned yellow and become shriveled after five days. Further examination of the ovicidal properties of phthalic glyceryl alkyd resin showed that it possesses a remarkable insecticidal efficiency. No injury was observed on plants tested experimentally under greenhouse and field conditions. Concentrations less than 2 per cent. (but not less than 1 per cent.) were effective on adults but not on ova; above 2 per cent. the margins of the leaves were burned.

The following plants were sprayed with beneficial results and without injury to the leaves: alfalfa (Medicago sativa L.), almond (Prunus communis Fritsch. and P. nana Stokes), apple (Pyrus malus L.), apricot (Prunus armeniaca L. and P. mume Sieb. & Zucc.), begonia (Begonia octapetala L'Her., B.

tuberhybrida Voss., B. semperflorens Link and Otto, B. haageana Wats., and B. rex Putz.), Coleus blumei Benth., florists cyclamen (Cyclamen indicum L.), Gardenia veitchii Bailey, Pelargonium sp., grape (Vitis vinifera L.), Hydrangea hortensis Smith, India rubber plant (Ficus elastica Roxb.), ivy (Hedera helix L.), poinsettia (Euphorbia pulcherrima Willd.), plum (Prunus americana Marsh), rose (Rosa sp.), snapdragon (Antirrhinum majus L.), strawberry (Fragaria sp.), and tomato (Lycopersicum esculentum Mill. var. vulgare Bailey).


An unidentified species of a very minute, white mite occurring on ivy and China asters (Callistephus chinensis Nees) and a begonia mite (probably Avrosia translucens Nietner) were also successfully controlled by a single application of 2 per cent. solution of phthalic glyceryl alkyd resin.

Since these experiments for the control of red spiders were performed also in commercial greenhouses and in the field, it seems highly probable that this chemical may find a wide application. Additional advantages which it possesses include no disagreeable odor, lack of spray residue on the leaves, its high degree of spreading capacity and only one application is necessary for killing the adults and the ova.

AMERICAN BEGONIA SOCIETY DUES

ITH the increasing membership in the American Begonia Society, a short discussion on the use that is made of the dues paid by each member should be in order.

The dollar dues, which entitle one to membership in the society, to attend branch meetings, and to become a member of a branch society, are used chiefly now to defray the publication costs of the Begonian. It has become increasingly evident that the little magazine, which is really the bond that holds together the membership of our large organization, must be allotted at least a dollar per member per year if it is to do credit to the organization and not become subsidized to advertising interests. This allotment, of course, would leave nothing to carry on the other functions of the society, such as research, the library, the herbarium, public relations, as well as the important offices of the secretary-treasurer.

The question arises whether it would be better to reduce the size of the Begonian or increase the annual dues. To do the first would deprive us of a means of expression and enjoyment that could not easily be recompensed; to do the latter would result in a more harmonious organization, in which the amateur hobbyists may be stimulated in their joy of growing begonias and the more advanced students of the genus Begonia may have the opportunity to exchange ideas and eventually contribute something outstanding to the scientific world.

To keep the American Begonia Society active, all of the officers contribute time and money without thought of compensation. Probably the most thankless and most exacting of the jobs are those of the editor and business manager of

the Begonian. To the former falls the task of assembling suitable material for the Begonian, and responsibility for its delivery to the publishers. The chief duty of the latter is to solicit and collect for the Begonian advertising—a job which takes a great deal of time but which has been necessary to keep the bulletin going during the last two years.

With a dollar definitely budgeted to the Begonian, it could be published without the necessity of soliciting advertising from non-members; thus a great deal of expense would be saved which the business manager has been meeting personally, without reimbursement by the society.

A subscription price of one dollar per year to an up and coming magazine like the Begonian is not out of line with the usual price for such publications. An additional charge for dues would certainly not be out of order and would help to reimburse the hard-working officers who not only have to contribute too much of their valuable time to the benefit of the members, but have to put out cash from their own pockets to carry out the duties of their offices.

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REPORT OF THE RESEARCH DEPARTMENT FOR 1941

E were fortunate in having an unusually large quantity of seeds of begonia species to distribute to members of the "Arm Chair Explorers" this year. Nearly three thousand packets of seeds were mailed out, which included thirty-seven different varieties. While in some instances there was not enough seeds of a particular species to give to each subscriber, as equitable as possible, a division was made.

As each subscriber paid but one dollar, the packets figure less than a third of a cent each. I rather doubt that we will again be able to duplicate this.

The following is the list of species mailed out: boliviensis, froebelli, Himalaya (tuberous), 1971, Martiana, pearcei, Costa Rica No. 1, 2, 3, 4; Panama (rhizomatous), Costa Rica No. 6, scharffiana, Panama, bractiosa, davisii, coccinea, Mexico (rhizomatous), peltata, jurpia, satrapin, Mexico No. 12, Mexico No. 13, rosaeflora, Engleri, johnstonii, laciniata, sikkimensis, cathcartii, ovatifolia, Manda's Wolley Bear, semperflorens (semidble), semperflorens (Germany), gigantea, xanthina, griffithi, josephi.

up amongst the seeds received from India. Some rather unusual rex formations have been reported by members from this group. Most of the seeds germinated well and while some of the species may have little commercial value, they are often prized as collector's items.

Some of the projects planned for this year have had to be either abandoned or revised and any statement at this time would be premature. A new Bulletin on Tuberous Begonias was published early in the year and a great many of them have been sold

Last year we had planned to photograph species of begonias in conjunction with the Nomenclature Department and half of the funds donated to the Research Department by the Inglewood Branch of the Society are being used for this purpose. No doubt a report on this work will be given out at a later date.

There are more requests from our library for copies of Die Begonien than there are books, and some members

have been waiting patiently for over a year for their turn to arrive.

We now have bound copies of our Begonian from Volume I (1934) to and including Volume VIII (1941). Our first Monthly Bulletin as it was then called, consisted of but one single mimeographed sheet. The next issue contained three sheets, the next four, and with this humble beginning our Begonian is now a very sizeable Magazine.

For the benefit of new members it might be well to call to their attention the fact that thru all these years no Officer of the Society, Editor, nor any of the Staff have ever received any compensation for their services. What a glorious tribute to the lovers of flowers.

May our Society and the Begonian continue to grow and still retain its "Informal and friendly air", that has so characterized this organization from its inception. It has been a privilege and a pleasure to have been included amongst its staff of officers.—L. E. Day, Research Director.

commended. Between the Robinson article, the speaker on Semperflorens and our hostess' plants, we were inspired enough to agree that each one would start a cutting of this plant, to be shown, whatever its condition, at the 1942 annual meeting. This contest is open to any New England member.

In August we met in a member's greenhouse, to see and discuss Diadema and Rare Kinds. Diadema, we all agree, is difficult in New England. Our host showed us the largest and most beautiful specimens of Peltata we had ever seen. The soil was fifty per cent oak leaf mould, unsifted, with plenty of old cow manure in it. Peltata and Venosa should be grown like succulents, with careful watering. Cathayana needs shade and warm, moist air. Three distinct types of Costa Rica No. 4 seedlings were shown, also a Mexican unnamed seedling, a rhizomatous type with a small, serrate, waxen leaf, a delicate grower. Kodachrome slides were shown of a member's cloth house, filled with tuberous begonias, and other garden slides.

The annual meeting at Durham, N. H. has been reported in the October Begonian. The last two meetings were on the Rubra group, and the concensus of opinion is that the Rubra type is too large for window sill culture. The best bloomers are Annabel and Jinnie May, which will bloom when small. We find that Jinnie May, after years as a low spreading plant, has suddenly remembered its Rubra blood, and is becoming as tall as its ancestors.

We are planning an educational exhibit for the spring flower show in Boston next March, illustrating simple methods of house culture which any one may copy, such as seeds started on a brick "grandmother," cuttings rooted in a glass bowl, small or delicate plants under a glass tumbler or in a Wardian case, home made humidifiers and so forth.

The next three months without meetings will be busy with planning this exhibit, and our new program. Our group is a small one, with membership scattered over six states, and long drives over snowy or icy roads would be difficult, so we recess for the three midwinter months.

to have been collecting Begonias for 40 years!

In 1921 Bessie Buxton of Peabody, Mass. started the round robin Begonia Club; and the original, and I do not know how many more are still in existence.

Sometime in 1929-1930, some friends of H. P. Dyckman gave him some small plants and cuttings of Begonias. His interest in Begonias was aroused, and in a short time he had a lath house 12'x18'. Mr. Dyckman and Mr. Reidman exhibited their specimen Begonia plants at some annual Dahlia shows in 1930 and 1931, arousing much comment and interest.

In January 1932 at the home of Clayton Kelly in Long Beach, California, the American Begonia Society officially came into existence, with Mr. Dyckman as President.

The organization was first known as

the California Begonia Society, but through the efforts of Mr. Kelly who was writing to places all over the world to try and secure seed of the new and different varieties, others learned of the society and soon there were so many members in so many different sections of the country that it was decided to change the name to the American Begonia Society.

Bessie Buxton and Mr. A. D. Robinson are given credit for much aid in increasing the membership by giving it publicity.

Mrs. Kathryn Weitz and her husband of Ventura joined the American Begonia Society but as the trip to Long Beach was 90 miles each way, and it was always after 1 P.M. when they reached home, she decided to start a branch of The American Begonia Society which she did in May 1937 and named it Theodosia Burr Shepherd, an early resident of Ventura and one of California's first flower and seed growers.



HYBRIDIZING BEGONIAS

by ROY BERRY

HERE have at various times been articles telling how to plant seeds and how to raise the plants, but nothing on how to get the seeds.

There is a real interest and kick in watching your own seed grow into large plants and find that you have something worth while.

Most begonias must be hand pollenized to set seed. To pollenize most plants the pollen is transferred from the male or pollen bearing bloom with a camel hair brush, but with begonias it is much more simple.

First be sure that you use bloom that has pollen. Tap lightly on your nail and if pollen is in the bloom pinch off the bloom and use as a brush to dust the pollen into the female bloom which will be known by the three winged seed pod at the base of the petals. Let this pod dry on the plant and do not waste time planting seed from a pod which has fallen off because they will not be fertile.

About four years ago I got the idea that it would be well worth while to put a small colored leaf on a branching plant of tall growth.

Dregii (semi tuberous) was the answer as to small leaf and branching type, Rex naturally was to supply color.

I made the cross with Dregii as the seed parent. My hope of getting something different was realized, but instead of a tall branching type I got the exact opposite, a low growing, non branching plant and so far as I can discover it is the smallest, most compact begonia of the Rex type grown. A picture of the compact growth can be visualized when

I tell you that a plant with 132 leaves in a 6 inch pot has a spread of only 10 inches and stands but 5 inches above the pot.

Another plant with 218 leaves in an 8 inch pot has a spread of 12 inches and stands but 8 inches above the pot.

It seems to be the rule that out of most plantings all plants will be close to the parent plants in shape or growing habit, but once in a blue moon one plant will show up that has something that sets it apart from the rest. That one plant is what we all strive for, "Something different."

The surprising thing about the Rex-Dregii cross is that I got about 15 plants with different colors and markings, from silver up thru the pink to the deep plum of Lucy Closson and the brown green of O'Diggins to the rich green of Emaraud. The leaf is from Dregii as to size and shape, the color from the Rex, the root stock is rather semi tuberous as is Dregii and the leaf grows like Rex with the leaf stem direct from the root.

This may be the start of a direct connection between Rex and tuberous whereby a worthy bloom may be put on the Rex.

Reversing the cross with Dregii as the pollen parent, may give us color on the tall branching type.

So far I have been unable to set seed on this cross.
